Prof. Dr. Elisabeth Bronfen, the moderator, is a cultural and literary critic, an author and professor of English language and literature. Prof. Bronfen has published numerous articles and books in the areas of gender studies and psychoanalysis.

Prof. Dr. Ernst Fehr holds the chair of the department of microeconomics and empirical economic research at the University of Zurich. In addition he conducts research and lectures worldwide at renowned universities on the understanding of psychological and sociological interrelationships in the economy. In 2008 he became the first economist to win the Marcel Benoist Prize, the "Swiss Nobel Prize". He is a leading representative of an emerging movement among economists dealing with human decision-making behavior and even incorporating brain research. He has proven in his research that many individuals have a pronounced sense of fairness and are prepared to cooperate voluntarily -- even if it costs them something.
